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INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT

To the Board of Directors Town of Hempstead Local Development Corporation

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of the Town of Hempstead Local Development Corporation (the Corporation), which comprise the statements of financial position as of December 31, 2015 and 2014 and the related statements of activities and cash flows for the years then ended, and the related notes to the financial statements.

Management's Responsibility for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America; this includes the design, implementation and maintenance of internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

Auditor's Responsibility

Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on our audits. We conducted our audits in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards*, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audits to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free of material misstatement.

An audit involves performing procedures to obtain audit evidence about the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

1. **Nature of activities:**

The Town of Hempstead Local Development Corporation (the Corporation) was created in 1966 by the Town Board of the Town of Hempstead, under the provisions of the Laws of New York State. The purpose of the Corporation is to relieve and reduce unemployment, promote and provide for additional and maximum employment, improve and maintain job opportunities, instruct or train individuals to improve or develop their capabilities for such jobs, carry on scientific research for the purpose of aiding the Town of Hempstead by attracting new industry, through the encouragement of the development of or retention of an industry and lessen the burdens of the government, while acting in the public interest.

The Corporation is governed by a Board of Directors whose members are appointed by the Town of Hempstead Town Board.

2. **Summary of significant accounting policies:**

An understanding of the Corporation's practices will facilitate the review of the financial statements.

Basis of accounting: The financial statements of the Corporation have been prepared on the accrual basis of accounting and, accordingly, revenues are recorded when earned and expenses are recorded when incurred.

Basis of presentation: Financial statement presentation follows the recommendations of generally accepted accounting principles. In accordance with generally accepted accounting principles, the Corporation is required to report information regarding its financial position and activities according to three classes of net assets: unrestricted net assets, temporarily restricted net assets and permanently restricted net assets.

Unrestricted net assets are resources available to support operations. The only limits on the use of unrestricted net assets are the broad limits resulting from the nature of the Corporation, the environment in which it operates, and the purposes specified in its corporate documents. All of the Corporation's net assets are classified as unrestricted at December 31, 2015 and 2014.

Temporarily restricted net assets are resources that are restricted by a donor for use for a particular purpose or in a particular future period. Permanently restricted net assets are resources whose use is limited by donor-imposed restrictions that neither expire by being used in accordance with a donor's restriction nor by the passage of time. The Corporation does not have any temporarily or permanently restricted net assets at December 31, 2015 or 2014.

2. **Summary of significant accounting policies (continued):**

Cash and cash equivalents: For purposes of the Statements of Cash Flows, investments with maturities of three months or less when purchased are considered cash equivalents.

Income tax status: The Corporation was duly established under Sections 402 and 1411 of the Not-For-Profit Corporation Law and is a corporate quasi-governmental agency performing an essential governmental function. The income of the Corporation is excludable from gross income under Section 115(i) of the Internal Revenue Code and, accordingly, these financial statements do not reflect a provision for income taxes.

Use of estimates: The preparation of financial statements in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenue and expenses during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

Property and equipment: Property and equipment are stated at cost. It is the Corporation's policy to capitalize any expenditures with an estimated useful life of greater than one year.

Depreciation: Depreciation is provided using the straight-line method over the estimated useful lives of the assets.

Advertising costs: Advertising costs are charged to operations when incurred. Advertising costs for the years ended December 31, 2015 and 2014 are \$5,720 and \$-0-, respectively.

Subsequent events: Subsequent events have been evaluated through March 25, 2016, which is the date the financial statements were available to be issued.

3. **Functional classification of expenses:**

Expenses by function for the years ended December 31, 2015 and 2014 were as follows:

4. <u>Conduit debt obligations, bond transactions:</u>

The Corporation issues tax-exempt bonds to provide financial assistance to non-profit entities for the acquisition and construction of industrial, recreational and commercial facilities deemed to be in the public interest. The bonds are secured by the property financed and are payable solely from payments received on the underlying mortgage loans. Upon repayment of the bonds, ownership of the acquired facilities transfers to the private-sector entity served by the bond issuance. Neither the Corporation, the State, nor any political subdivision thereof, is obligated in any manner for repayment of the bonds. Accordingly, the bonds are not reported as liabilities in the accompanying financial statements.

As of December 31, 2015 and 2014, outstanding debt induced by the Corporation and issued by other entities amount to approximately \$375,686,498 and \$380,035,729, respectively. Debt service is paid directly to the lender by the entity that incurred the supplemental debt. The Corporation has no liability or contingent liability for payment.

5. <u>Cash and cash equivalents</u>:

The Corporation maintains cash accounts with one bank. At December 31, 2015, the balances of cash accounts are insured up to \$250,000 by the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation.

At December 31, 2015, the Corporation's bank balances were \$1,499,345. Of that total, \$250,000 was covered by the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation and \$1,249,345 was secured by collateral held by the pledging financial institution's agent, a third-party financial institution, but not in the Corporation's name.

7. **Related party transactions:**

The Corporation shares office space with the Town of Hempstead Industrial Development Agency (the Agency), a related party. The Corporation and the Agency have the same executive and deputy executive directors.

The Agency and the Corporation have an agreement in which the Corporation reimburses the Agency for shared costs, including office space, supplies and telephone. These expenses have been reflected in the appropriate expense categories. Amounts reimbursed to the Agency for the years ended December 31, 2015 and 2014 were \$6,750 and \$6,657, respectively. In addition, during the year ended December 31, 2015, the Corporation reimbursed the Agency for \$5,500 for advertising expenses. At December 31, 2015 and 2014, the Corporation owed \$8,825 and \$3,277, respectively, to the Agency, which is reflected on the Statements of Financial Position as accrued expenses.

During the year ended December 31, 2014, the Agency passed a resolution to reimburse the Corporation for prior years' salary and related payroll taxes when the Corporation had an employee. This amount was determined to be \$26,904, \$9,914 of which is shown on the Corporation's 2014 Statement of Financial Position as due from Town of Hempstead Industrial Development Agency.



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INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT ON INTERNAL CONTROL OVER FINANCIAL REPORTING AND ON COMPLIANCE AND OTHER MATTERS BASED ON AN AUDIT OF FINANCIAL STATEMENTS PERFORMED IN ACCORDANCE WITH GOVERNMENT AUDITING STANDARDS

To the Board of Directors Town of Hempstead Local Development Corporation

We have audited, in accordance with the auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards* issued by the Comptroller General of the United States, the financial statements of the Town of Hempstead Local Development Corporation (the Corporation), which comprise the statement of financial position as of December 31, 2015, and the related statements of activities and cash flows for the year then ended, and the related notes to the financial statements, and have issued our report thereon dated March 25, 2016.

Internal Control Over Financial Reporting

In planning and performing our audit of the financial statements, we considered the Corporation's internal control over financial reporting (internal control) to determine the audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances for the purpose of expressing our opinion on the financial statements, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the Corporation's internal control. Accordingly, we do not express an opinion on the effectiveness of the Corporation's internal control.

A *deficiency in internal control* exists when the design or operation of a control does not allow management or employees, in the normal course of performing their assigned functions, to prevent, or detect and correct, misstatements on a timely basis. A *material weakness* is a deficiency, or a combination of deficiencies, in internal control, such that there is a reasonable possibility that a material misstatement of the entity's financial statements will not be prevented, or detected and corrected on a timely basis. A *significant deficiency* is a deficiency, or a combination of deficiencies, in internal control that is less severe than a material weakness, yet important enough to merit attention by those charged with governance.

Our consideration of internal control was for the limited purpose described in the first paragraph of this section and was not designed to identify all deficiencies in internal control that might be material weaknesses or significant deficiencies. Given these limitations, during our audit we did not identify any deficiencies in internal control that we consider to be material weaknesses. However, material weaknesses may exist that have not been identified.
